CALL TO ORDER:

Chair Crist, called the regular board meeting to order at 6:07 p.m.

COMMENTS FROM THE CHAIR:

Chair Crist made the following comments:

- Congratulated GCCC baseball coach Chris Finnegan for reaching his 400th career win.
- Recognized and congratulated the 215 student athletes that achieved a 3.0 GPA for the fall semester.
- Reminded Trustees that Wednesday, February 15, 2017 all Military will be honored at the basketball game. All military with the proper identification will get into the game free.
- Saturday, February 18 is "White-Out Night at the DPAC" Fans are encouraged to wear white, and proceeds from the event will go to Relay for Life.
- Chair Crist reminded Trustees that campus will be closed on Monday, February 20 in observance of President's day.
- Special guest, Marie Bradley, Great Western Dining was recognized as a nominee for Garden City Chamber of Commerce small business of the year.

OPEN COMMENTS FROM PUBLIC:

Chair Crist noted that no one from the public had registered to make comments.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

This portion of the meeting is related to student accomplishments, activities, campus visitors, and special events that have taken place in the GCCC campus community since the last Board of Trustee meeting.

Dr. Swender took a few minutes to introduce Marie Bradley, Manage of Food Services with Great Western Dining, Inc. Marie and Great Western Dining, Inc. are one of the nominated businesses for the Garden City Chamber Business of the Year Award. Bradley and her staff were congratulated by Trustees and attendees of the meeting.

Dr. Swender shared that Dr. Bob Zellner, a civil rights activist, was the speaker at the Martin Luther King Celebration at Garden City Community College on Monday, January 16, 2017. Over 300 GCCC students, employees, and community members packed the gym to hear Zellner speak.

The Broncbuster Football team celebrated their national championship in the State Capitol, Wednesday, January 18, 2017. Athletic Director John Green, Dr. Swender, coaches, cheer team, and members of the football team, were on hand to be honored by the Kansas Governor, the Honorable Sam Brownback, Resolutions from The Kansas State House of Representatives, and the Kansas Senate.

GCCC displayed a table hosted by GCCC's Kristi Tempel and Stephanie Whitsell at Higher Education Days in the Capitol on Thursday, January 19. Various GCCC promotional materials and "goodies" were distributed throughout the day to visitors. GCCC baskets were delivered with the help of Trustee Melvin Neufeld to various friends and legislators who stopped by the booth for a visit.

The GCCC Endowment Association celebrated their 50th anniversary with a Gala on Saturday, January 21. The event was held in the Dining Hall at the Beth Tedrow Student Center. Over 80 guests attended the beautifully decorated event to celebrate the occasion. Dr. Swender and his wife Diana were in attendance and ongratulated GCCC Endowment Director, Jeromy Gigot on a successful event.

The GCCC Ag Department helped with Finney County Farm Bureau "Friends on the Farm", on January 20 at the Finney County Fair Grounds. The program teaches area fourth grade students and their teachers about agriculture. Over 700 area fourth graders attended the event.

The GCCC Collegiate Farm Bureau Quiz team placed 3rd at the Young Farmers and Ranchers competition in Manhattan, January 28. Dr. Swender shared that a faculty/administration Quiz Bowl has been suggested in the near future.

The GCCC Ag Department hosted the Southwest District Speech, Sales, and Discussion FFA Competition on February 1[,] in the Beth Tedrow Student Center. Over 70 area FFA students participated in the competition.

Dr. Swender reported that he attended a press conference in Topeka on February 3 to support the Governor's initiative on \$15,000 Baccalaureate degrees. Dr. Swender stated that he shared three key points during the press conference.

- At Garden City Community College we support the Governor's goal to deliver high quality Kansas higher education at an affordable price.
- We look forward to working with our state universities to develop pathways toward \$15,000 Baccalaureate degree programs.
- The Kansas community college system and especially GCCC welcomes any opportunities to advance our greatest natural resource—our human resource.

The GCCC College Singers held a Valentine's Choral on Thursday, February 9. The theme for the evening was love songs with group performances and solos. The evening was a success, with a packed auditorium.

GCCC had a booth last week at the Kansas Gang Investigators Association Conference at the Clarion Inn. Many officers visited the booth to look at Cyber Security Courses as well as the Criminal Justice Program. GCCC awarded a \$500.00 general scholarship and a tuition scholarship for the Cyber Security courses.

On Wednesday, February 8, over 215 student- athletes were honored at the home Basketball Game vs. Hutch, for receiving a grade point average of 3.0 or above. Dr. Swender extended his congratulations to the student athletes.

Baseball won four games in two days of double-header action with Western Nebraska. With the four game sweep, coach Finnegan receives his 400th career win, Dr. Swender congratulated Coach Finnegan on this accomplishment.

Lady Buster softball won two games of their home double-header, Saturday, February 11vs. Hesston to bring their record to 3-3.

Nhicolas Aponte, SGA President, reported that the group handed out candy and balloons on campus for Valentine's Day. Terpstra reported that Faculty Senate will be accepting nominations until March 8 for senate offices. Faculty Senate will host a luncheon on April 21. Terpstra shared with Trustees that the English Department had a successful implementation this spring of the Writing Center located in the library. The Student Success Center has received a grant to assist with computers; in addition, seventeen faculty members have committed to help in the center as tutors.

Trustees thanked Mr. Terpstra for his report.

Dr. Swender shared with Trustees that during a special ceremony on February 13, he signed a Memorandum of Agreement that establishes a formal linkage between Garden City Community College (GCCC), the Kansas Army National Guard and Pittsburg State University (PSU). The linkage provides a path for GCCC students to take the first two years of the Senior Reserve Officers Training Corps (SROTC) curriculum and then transfer to PSU to finish the final two years of the SROTC curriculum and receive a commission into the U. S. Army. This is one of a very few, if not the only full ROTC partnerships in the nation on a two year campus.

The college has the opportunity to purchase the remaining four (4) apartment buildings located at 1703, 1707, 1709 and 1713E. Laurel Street. In addition, included in the purchase is an office/shop building located at 1705 E. Laurel Street. The property, currently owned by John and Carmen Wagner, will provide much needed housing for GCCC. The proposed property will be purchased through a lease-purchase agreement with Clayton Holdings, LLC which is affiliated with Garden City's Commerce Bank. The 10-year lease purchase will be repaid with proceeds from student room and board fees.

In accordance with Kansas Statutes, the college published an official notice to purchase and finance the purchase of property and replacement of the residence hall parking lot (south lot). The required 30-day protest period has passed with no protest being filed.

Budget Information:

Residential Life Auxiliary Fund – debt service commitment will be approximately \$375,000 annually

Recommended Board Action:

The Board authorizes Administration to negotiate a contract to purchase property at 1703, 1705, 1707, 1709 and 1713 E. Laurel St. not to exceed \$1,755,000. Additionally, the board authorizes the administration to enter into a lease/purchase agreement with Clayton Holdings, LLC not to exceed total financing costs of \$3 million that includes purchase of property, replacement of residence hall parking lot, and replacement of parking lot sewer line.

Background Information:

The original presentation on January 10, 2017, discussed financing of the Residence Hall (south) parking lot replacement and purchasing the remaining four units of the Wagner Apartments. The college's architect designed and released specifications for the complete replacement of the residential life parking lot. Additionally included in the RFP was alternate proposals for replacing the sewer line, which is located under the residence hall parking lot and address needed repairs to a portion of the college's tunnel system in the quad area. The tunnel system serves as a mechanical pathway for HVAC, electrical and communication lines-original to the 1968 campus construction.

The asphalt parking lot will be replaced with concrete, additional lighting will be added and water drainage improved. The sewer line replacement involves the sewer line from the west hall residential life units to the city main. The sewer line is also original to the late 1968 construction and should be replaced while the parking lot is under construction. The mechanical tunnel "lid replacement project" includes removal and replacement of the pedestrian sidewalk, which is structural to the top, and sidewalls portions of the tunnel. The area involves the sidewalk from the intersection between the Fouse and Fine Arts buildings going west to the west side of the Fine Arts building totaling approximately 160 feet.

Bids were received from three contractors; JAG Construction Co., Dodge City, Lee Construction Co., Garden City, and Multicon Builders, Wichita, Kansas. Administrations recommendation is to accept the best proposal from JAG Construction.

Bookstore

Virga and Suzanne have been brainstorming, to come up with new ideas to create increased traffic in the store. They have also been working on completing a customer service survey utilizing the online software, Survey Monkey.

They have been shipping merchandise out to families with students signing to attend and play for GCCC! This has been the busiest semester to date for shipping merchandise to recruits-it has been awesome to help the families get what they need for their signings! Football championship gear has arrived. Campus Police

On February 21, 2017, campus police chief and GCCC Student Services staff attended Title IX training in Newton, Kansas. During the course, attendees received information regarding best practices for investigating sexual assaults and current requirements under Title IX. GCCC team members collaborated with each other to address the challenges of this important issue.

Marketing and Public Relations

Planning is underway for the Garden City Home Show booth on March 11, and 12. The daily signup sheets have been sent to employees requesting volunteers to work during the show.

The spring season of activities is ramping up and focus has shifted to promoting the many activities of the college. The annual Endowment Association Scholarship Auction is scheduled for April 7. Kristi is getting the word out with ads, social media, etc. Work began on promotion of the Cyber Security Camp coming up this summer. Promotions and press releases have been sent out for the upcoming "Artist in Residence" jazz festival, Monday March 6. Assistance was provided to promote hunter education and gun courses at the college. Promotions were also developed for the Adult Learning Center's AO-K program that offers career pathways for adults with families who have not completed high school or a GED. Marketing is coordinating with the Chamber to reserve and decorate a table for the March 9 chamber banquet. A press release was sent to announce GCCC Phi Theta Kappa All-Kansas Academic Team honorees, Kaitlynn Hammond and Rileigh Greathouse. GCCC officials will be present at the McCommunity night at McDonalds on March 7 to benefit the Ronald McDonald House. The Marketing Department assisted with the promotion this event with posts on social media and radio mentions.

Visits from Senator Pat Roberts and senior enlisted advisers from National Guard Bureau were covered. Press conferences for both events went smoothly. Publicity for both events was successful with coverage on radio, newspaper, and TV. Dairy Farmers of America (DFA) employees trained at the GCCC fire tower and pictures and posts on social media were prepared for the event.

Basketball, cheer and dance pictures were sent to graphic designer, Tiffany Heit, to create posters for sophomore night at the home basketball game. Softball and baseball games were attended, with

photographs taken for sports media. Pictures from the signing of two softball players were released. Many game activities have been covered during the month of February including Military Appreciation Night, Sophomore Night, Hoops for Hope, and the new gym floor unveiling.

Facilities

The custodial department has had many event setups this month including basketball game activities, the upcoming Jazz festival, and the KSHSAA Ensemble music festival Friday and Saturday.

Maintenance finished fire alarm testing for the year, worked on service problems in the food service area and worked on HVAC controls and air handling units. They completed work orders and replaced ballasts in the emergency lights in the Academic Building.

Ground keeping accomplishments for the month include putting up a windscreen for softball, painting of foul lines for softball and baseball, as well as dirt work on east campus.

Business Office

The business office met as a group a couple of times in early February to work on the annual department review and to work on the plan for our department. The team met to provide information for the department review and our strategic plan for the next several years. Draft documents were submitted of the plan and review.

February 21 was the first day of Spring financial aid disbursement. Pell grants, student loans and scholarships were posted to student accounts. Many students have credit balances after all their aid is posted and refund checks must be issued to the student. The business office has written 524 refund checks to students for a total of \$721,274. Financial Aid will continue to transmit aid over the next few weeks.

Print Shop

Tiffany Heit and Cecilia Miller have been producing materials for many departments this month. They have worked on sophomore posters, rodeo logo for 50th anniversary rodeo, rodeo posters, jazz festival tickets, FASFA flyers, tech program flyers, diplomas, and honors certificates. Ads were produced for Catch-It-Kansas Magazine and the State Basketball program.

IT Department

New computers were received, imaged and prepared for installation. The IT Department developed schedules for updating computers in multiple classrooms/labs.

The classroom/student lab in ACAD 1101 was completely updated with new machines, keyboards, monitors, and mice. These new machines are utilizing wireless internet access and have the latest operating systems and software.

In February, a new server was installed that allows faculty, staff and students the opportunity to electronically access library search engines and resources as if they were sitting inside the library. This proxy server will also enhance and support our distance learning presence at GCCC.

The IT Department worked alongside the Payroll Office to implement a new employee time card system. The software, called TimeClock Plus, allows hourly employees to clock in and out during the work day via a computer that is connected to the campus' network. The software has many new features that will allow all supervisors and managers the ability to oversee hours worked by employees in their respective departments.

The Athletic Department and the IT Department have collaborated on multiple projects to provide a greater level of internet access at athletic events. This includes streaming video at softball games, wireless access at all basketball games and a Plum Case that will provide internet access for student athletes while travelling to games played at other venues.

The new Web Developer has been very busy working with Administrators on multiple projects involving the college website, including page development that supports accreditation, distance learning initiative and website compliance. New updates will be ongoing.

The department continues its departmental review, including a comprehensive examination of strengths and weaknesses to help guide the department and its recommendations regarding the use of technology across campus. The department is also continuing formal and informal meetings to discuss strategic goals for the upcoming fiscal year.

Human Resources

The Human Resources Department has been working on spring reporting and recruiting for online adjuncts.

Payroll Department

In January, payroll personnel processed W-2 forms for 657 employees and processed the Affordable Care Act 1095-C forms.

Dallas established a remote Manager (supervisor) training session with the TimeClock Plus (TCP) representative in preparation to add another 28 hourly employees to the electronic timekeeping software on February 1. At the end of February, approximately 15 more hourly employees will begin using the system. The implementation includes continuing training until all managers are trained and all hourly employees are keeping their time in the new system. Eventually, the system will be used for leave request submission and approval allowing the elimination of paper leave requests.

An electronic payroll survey was released at the end of January. The results will assist in identifying potential improvements within the department and in producing information for the payroll department review and strategic planning. The short survey resulted in 4.41 out of 5-star rating on the following questions: Friendliness/Customer Service; Accuracy/Thoroughness of Information; Response Time to Inquiries; Access to Payroll Personnel; Privacy/Confidentiality; Management of Payroll Deductions; Management of Leave Recording; & Overall Rating of Payroll Dept.

GCCC has joined the Cisco Networking Academy. This partnership allows GCCC to explore their instructional resources and may facilitate economic development of new college course offerings in the area of computer networking and computer security.

Thanks to Janice and the CLC tutors, the Writing Center now offers evening hours 5 nights a week, including Sunday!

Eleven chemistry students are working on individual research projects – a separate project for each student – to be displayed & discussed as poster presentations at the American Chemical Society conference, April 3, in San Francisco.

Trish Keller and Sheena Hernandez attended Great Plains conference on acceleration.

Clay Wright and Choral Music department presented a Valentine Concert at GCCC Pauline Joyce Auditorium with the GCCC Choirs.

Clay Wright, Casey Hands, Joe Lowry and Chris Johnson attended KMEA (Kansas Music Educators Association) convention in Wichita.

The College Players attended Region V's Kennedy Center, American College Theatre Festival in Des Moines Iowa.
